The Lenoir County Livestock Development Board will sponsor a County Purebred Hog Sale in Kinston on Saturday, March 6 at 1 o'clock p.m. The sale is open to all breeds. A total of 25 animals have been consigned to the sale. This number includes 5 bred gilts, 23 open gilts, and 7 boars. The Spotted Poland, China, Hampshire, Poland, China, and Duroc breeds will be represented. An inspection committee will also make final approval of all animals entered in the sale. Each animal must have been vaccinated for cholera.

The quality of the hog offered for sale will be good. Farmers interested in securing some good foundation animals should attend this sale.
