Tom Davis Ch'm Welfare Board

Tom Davis of Pink Hill is the senior member and chairman of the Lenoir County Board of Public Welfare. Named to the board in July, 1948, he succeeded former chairman, Jack Rider, whose term on the board had expired in April, 1953.

A former mayor of Pink Hill and a prominent farmer and businessman, Davis has had a brief whirl in the political arena. He tilted unsuccessfully with incumbent Marion A. Parrott, local attorney, for the State Legislature in 1950.

Davis' board is responsible for coordinating all phases of the public welfare program in Lenoir County. Once a month the board meets with the superintendent or acting superintendent, to plan future work and to review the caseload. Before a welfare recipient is terminated from the program, his case is investigated thoroughly by the board and the caseworker within whose realm of activity the case falls. The same process applies to new cases. The caseworker theoretically is provided an opportunity to defend his or her recommendations in the cases.

In addition to the actual casework review, Davis and the other two members are expected to be thoroughly conversant with the needs of the department, both as regards finances and personnel. The board acts as a filter for job applications which are submitted to the County Commissioners as the final authority.
