## Attention Dog Owners "RABIES"

The County Commissioners have given me authority to put on a rabies program for 1954. Dr. H. A. Phillips, Wallace, has been named chief rabies inspector and Mr. Victor F. Williams, Wallace, has been named assistant rabies inspector. These two men will hold clinics as to be advertised later and do house to house vaccinations extending to July 1, 1954. After July 1, Mr. Williams will be accompanied by a member of the sheriff's department to check on all unvaccinated dogs. This means we are attempting to have a rabies program this year, furthermore, it means that nobody else will be authorized to vaccinate dogs for rabies.
