ORDER AUTHORIZING \$7,000 WITHDRAWAL FROM THE CAPITAL RESERVE FUND OF THE COUNTY OF DUPLIN

BE IT ORDERED by the Board of Commissioners of the County of Duplin, North Carolina:

Section 1. That pursuant to the County Capital Reserve Act of 1943, withdrawal from the Capital Reserve Fund of the County of Duplin of the amount of \$7,000 is hereby authorized for the purpose of constructing, together with other funds available therefor, an addition to the Courthouse annex of said County.

Section 2. That the source of moneys in said Capital Reserve Fund for such withdrawal is proceeds from the sale of County Home property.

Section 3. That this order shall take effect thirty days after its first publication unless in the meantime a petition for its submission to the voters is filed under said County Capital Reserve Act, and in such event it shall take effect when approved by the voters of the County at an election as provided in said Act.

The foregoing order was passed on the 5th day of April, 1954, and was first published on the 8th day of April, 1954. Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said order must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.

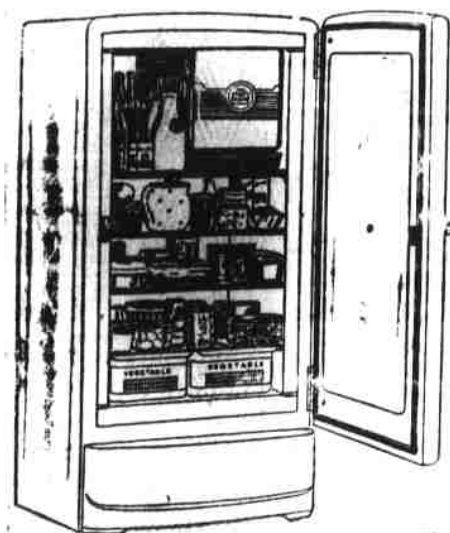

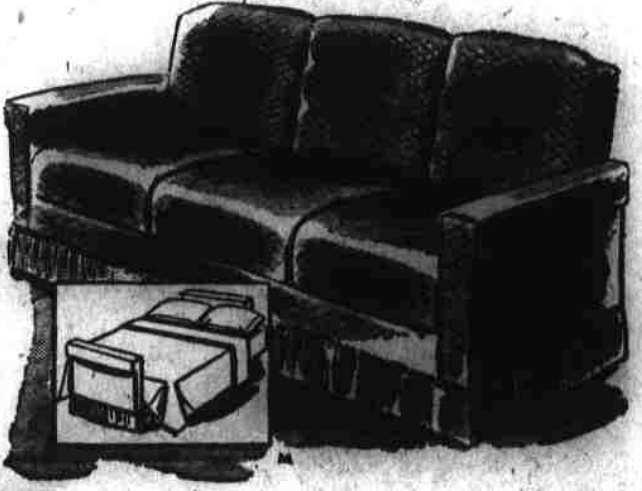
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
