## Dramatic Story "Martin Luther" Told In Film

Fear of sin and God's judgement struck terror in Martin Luther's heart. So, like many others in the 16th century, the young law student in Erfurt Germany, sought shelter in a monastery.

This is the dramatic opening of "Martin Luther," the half-million dollar feature film produced on location in Western Germany by Louis de Rochemont Associates, responsible for such provocative cinema achievements as "Lost Boundaries" and "Walk East of Beacon."

The picture will be shown at the Rose Hill Theatre beginning Tuesday, April 23 for four big days. Based on the life of the 16th century monk who defied excommunication and the stake in his demand for religious reform, "Martin Luther" provides the first motion picture portrayal of the incendiary beginning of the Protestant Reformation.

As an Augustinian monk, Luther tried to find peace of mind and soul through study, work, worship, and confession. But he soon came to the conclusion that, no matter what he did, he was not able to escape the fear of evil and punishment.

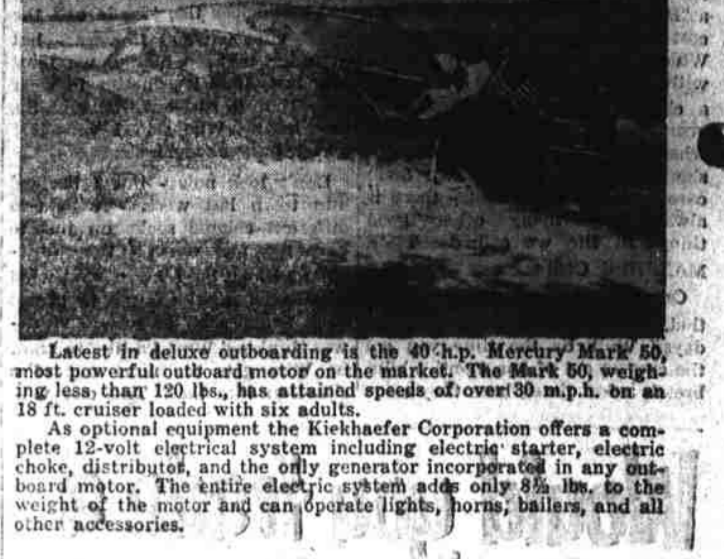
One day in his tower room in Wittenberg University, he found his answer - and he says, "It was like the gates of heaven opened to me." Reading St. Paul's Epistle to the Romans 1:17, he came to this conclusion: "A man can't earn salvation by what he himself does. Man gains salvation through faith in Christ, through what God has done for man through this Saviour."

So Luther fought against the sale of indulgences - letters of pardon from punishment of sin - which the Medici Pope, Leo X, had authorized. He demanded that the church of his day be cleansed of secular abuses and that the authority for doctrine and practice be Scripture rather than Popes of Councils. To bring up the abuse of indulgences for debate, he nailed 95 theses - points of argument - on the castle church door. But what was intended as a university discussion became an argument that split the Roman Catholic Church and the Holy Roman Empire.

Labeled a heretic, Luther was excommunicated by the Pope and banished and condemned by Emperor Charles V. He was spirited away to safety by Duke Frederick Thigpen, Evelyn Penny, Peggy Jo Rhodes, Lorraine Thigpen, Griselle Whaley, Donald Edwards, James Robert Grady, Percy Kennedy, Rayburn Rhodes, Arlene Batchelor, Ursula Williams, Janice Bostic, Margaret Mercer, Kay Quinn, Norma Simpson, Linda Thigpen, and Sidney Blizzard.

of Saxony and spent his years of banishment teaching and preaching, writing a catechism for use by family and pastor, and by translating the Bible into the language of the people. Luther did not die at the stake like his forerunners John Hus and Savonarola. Instead he lived on to see the Protestant nobles and theologians reject Charles V's demand to abandon their "heresies" and re-unite with Church and Empire. Luther's beliefs found expression in their Augustburg Confession of Faith. And his demand for reform, rejected by the worldly Pope Leo X, gave birth to an evangelical movement that quickly spread throughout Europe and the world.

Niall MacGinnis, distinguished British veteran of the Old Vic Theatre in London, plays the title role in "Martin Luther." Irving Pichel of Hollywood, who has to his credit such films as "The Moon is Down," "Tomorrow is Forever" and "Miracle of the Bells," directed and plays one of the key roles.

The script, prepared by Allen Sloane and Lothar Wolff, of Rochemont associate who also served as producer, is based upon Catholic and Protestant sources and leans heavily on historic documents for its facts and dialogue.

The following are comments made by Rev. C. E. Vyle, and Rev. W. H. Allison of Rose Hill who previewed the picture before its showing.

The picture "Martin Luther," I consider the best religious picture that I have seen. It is a forceful, yet fair and factual account of an important period in Protestant history. I urge all Christian people to see it.

Although primarily a religious and historical picture, it captures and holds one's interest to the end. Charles E. Vyle
