Reach 1944 Peak

Taxes of your telephone service eached their peak in 1944 when "war tax rates." These higher rates were imposed at the time to help raise revenue, and to discourage the use of telephone at a time when the vernment needed these facilities or war communications, and when new service could not be installed or expanded because of the lack of materials and manpower.

The law provided that these taxe should expire six months after the close of hostilities.

Reductions or eliminations of this tax will not put one more penny into the treasury of the Carolina Telephone and Telegraph Company All the telephone company has been doing for these past years was to act a stax collector for Uncle Sam,

The money collected from telephone subscribers has been sent to Washington about as fast as it was ollected. The only people that will be helped by the repeal of this law are the people who use the tele-phone, the official added.
