Pink Hill Civilian Club Gets Charter

Pink Hill, April 22 - "Civic clubs are the hub of community leadership," E. B. Stone, governor of North Carolina District of Civilian International, declared at the charter meeting of the Pink Hill Civilian Club held here Wednesday night, April 21st.

Pointing out the great changes in America with the coming of the atomic age, Stone said the Civilian

clubs must mold their projects to fit the needs of the community. "The Civilian Club must set its goal as the building of good citizens," he said. The club could aid in the development of better citizens by four ways, the speaker noted. He cited these as development within the Civilian Club, within the adult population of the community, by adding the unfortunate and by setting good examples for youth.

In presenting the charter to the Pink Hill Club, Guilford Worsley, of Rocky Mount, Lt. Governor of Civilian Zone Number 9, said that it was through hope and faith in God, a better city and a better life, that the club was being formed. Citing Thomas Edison as a Civilian who

had done much for the benefit of mankind, Worsley urged the new members to be "proud to be a Civilian."

Acceptance of the charter and response was by acting president Frank S. Wiley. Officers and charter members were installed by Luther Medlin, Civilian International trustee. lin has not forgotten its human needs. A splendid 50-bed hospital, a health center and a nurses' home are being constructed at a cost of \$834,000 in Kenansville, the county seat. Local funds put up for these projects being built under the North Carolina Medical Care Commission program totaled \$193,000. Several modern Negro schools and a Negro resort, one of only a few in the state, are being built in the county. Electrification has spread to nearly all farms. Attractive homes are springing up along newly paved roads. More than 500 home demonstration club members and 1,800 4-H, FFA, and FHA boys and girls are learning new techniques. Rural churches are taking the lead in building better communities.

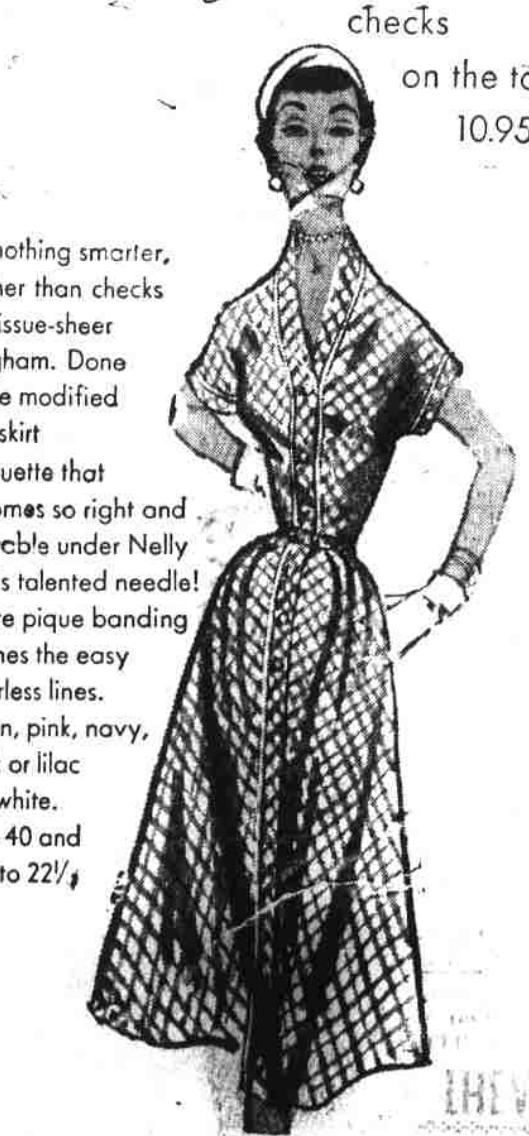
