For a home to be approved it must meet certain requirements. Following this approval each is licensed by the State Department of Public Welfare. Boarding homes are becoming more and more in demand. Changes in our economic system have brought about smaller homes for families, giving them less space in which to care for the older person. People are living longer, and as a result we have an increasing population of oldsters, many of whom are unable to live alone from a physical or financial standpoint or both. A boarding home or nursing home is the next step unless relatives can help.
