AN EXCELLENT APPOINTMENT

Governor William B. Umstead has made an excellent appointment to our way of thinking. Although some political observers have already labeled the new senator as a "conservative", it is our belief that it is a rather hurried expression. To us, Senator Ervin is classified as a "Liberal-Conservative", in other words a "middle of the roader." Judging from his past record, we believe he will stand for things that will be good for a progressive North Carolina and at the same time upholding the conservative traditions upon which our country was founded.

At this writing it appears that the appointment of Judge Ervin has reacted most favorably with the public, the bar and the press and it is expected that Judge Ervin will have little trouble in winning the approval of the State Democratic Executive Committee for the two years remaining of the unexpired term of the late Senator Clyde R. Hoey.

The successor of Clyde R. Hoey will have some big shoes to fill and Judge Sam J. Ervin seems to us to be more qualified for the position than any other person in the State.

With a record that includes service in the North Carolina Legislature, in the National House of Representatives, on the Superior Court Bench and on the State Supreme Court Bench since 1948, Judge Ervin is an able and fully qualified man and the people know it.

In addition to being one of the most distinguished lawyers in the state, Senator Ervin is one of the excellent speakers with warm and sincere personality. He is a determined campaigner and is well known from the seashore to the mountains as a man of courage.
