Warsaw Veterans Take Stand For Care Of Sick Vets

The American Legion stands pat today in its championships of all veteran laws granting hospital care to veterans with non-service-connected disabilities who are "sick, broke and have no place to go."

This basic rehabilitation position of the American Legion was set forth today by Commander Mitchell Britt of the Charles R. Gavin Post No. 127 of Warsaw.

"This firm American Legion position has been reaffirmed by its National Executive Committee," Commander Britt said. "It is supported by the House Veterans Affairs Committee, of which Mrs. Edith Nourse Rogers, Republican of Massachusetts, is the chairman. This Committee by unanimous vote has approved a care of non-service-connected neuropsychiatric and tubercular veterans. It has also endorsed the hospitalization of other groups of non-service-connected veterans where beds are available and the veteran does not have the ability to pay for private care."

Abuse Charges Unfounded

Commander Britt pointed out that the House Committee gave its approval to existing laws after it had made its own thorough study of all aspects of VA hospital care.

"The Committee failed to find any substantiation of charges of widespread abuse of VA hospitalization," he said. This Congressional study coincided with a bed-to-bed check of some 5,000 cases of non-service-connected patients in VA hospitals. This American Legion survey showed that in most cases the veteran had exhausted his private resources before he applied or was sent to the VA by his own doctor.

Commander Britt said The American Legion is on record as demanding strict compliance with the laws governing VA hospitalization and demanding the prosecution of any chiselers. To this end it has approved a fair trial of the addendum to the hospital admission form — A Form 10-P-10—which now requires the listing of assets and liabilities of non-service-connected veterans applying for hospitalization. Use of data supporting the American Legion bed-to-bed check of non-service-connected patients to the effect that the average veteran seeking such hospitalization is honest and goes to the VA as the court of last resort.
