#### Non-Farm **Employment In** State Has Dropped

Carolina Department of Labor that employment dropped 9,000 in the State during the month of May. The job declines occurred in textiles, chemicals, furniture, and who-

esale and retail trade industries. The State's total non-farm employment figure stood at 975,600 in mid-May, compared with 984,600 in mid April. The total wa sdown 27, 000-or 2.7 per cent below the level of May, 1953, when 1,002,600 people were employed in nonagricultural obs in the State.

A majariey of both the manufacturing and nonmanufacturing industries reported a lower employment level. In the State's giant textile industry, employment was down 6.1 per cent from the total of May 1953. Yarn and thread were down 10.5 per cent: broadweven fabrics, 5.4 per cent: Knitting mills. 3.5 per cent.

Employment in both the lumber ind furniture industries was eight ser cent below the level of May ast year. Jobs in the contract conplaced end to end, 90 per cent of sturction industry were down 10.9 the drivers would pull out to pass per cent
