First And Last Chance

TEXT: "And he said unto Jesus, Lord, remember me when thou comest into thy kingdom." Luke 23:42.

The words of this text are the words of one of the dying thieves who hung on a cross, next to the crucified Saviour. It was his last chance to be saved, and amidst the agonies of a horrible death, he cried out for mercy — "Lord, remember me when thou comest into thy kingdom." But, while the occasion was the thief's last chance to be saved it was, in all probability, the first and only chance that he had ever had to put his trust in Christ and be saved. We have no record that he had ever come face to face with Christ before he and Christ hung side by side on crosses.

The tragic episode of the crucifixion, ghastly though it was, revealed to the world many unforgettable lessons, one of which is the assurance of salvation to all who, "call upon the name of the Lord" — and, through faith, "lay hold of eternal life." Yes, there is hope of salvation, even in the hour of death, where true repentance is shown, and sincere faith is exercised in redeeming blood of Christ. Such was true in the case of the dying thief; for, when, in the closing moments of life, he cried for mercy, he was assured by the sublime words of Jesus, who said: "Today shalt thou be with me in paradise."

However, while divine grace reaches to the deepest depths of human depravity, and follows a man to the very door of death, and makes it possible for salvation to be realized even at the closing moments of life, there is nothing in the entire Bible that encourages a person to delay, procrastinate and postpone the matter of "getting right with God," until one is face to face with death. All the prophets of God, as well as the New Testament Apostles, warned sinners against the dangers of neglecting salvation; and their pleas and exhortations could be well summed up in the words of Amos—"Prepare to meet thy God." (Amos 4:12) — NOW, not tomorrow, or next week, or next year, but NOW, TODAY! — "Behold, NOW is the day of salvation;" 2 Cor. 6:2. "How shall we escape, if we neglect so great salvation?" Death-bed repentance is possible, but not probable.

Handy Hint
For a quick sundae, break a pea-
nut candy bar into small pieces and
serve over ice cream — so good.
Save the juice from a jar of pickles
and use for thinning mayonnaise
before mixing with cabbage for
slaw.

Keep chunks of natural cheese
from drying out by wrapping in a
cloth soaked in vinegar and store
in the refrigerator.

You can have fresh parsley handy
at all times if you store it in a
plastic cover jar in the refrigerator.

Remove excess starch from a wet
iron by rubbing it over a hot,
soapy cloth. Then wipe with a dry
cloth.

For a refreshing dessert, make up
a package of frozen dessert mix.
Freeze and serve in halves of fresh
apricots or peaches.

Use paper cups and cover tightly for
safe traveling.

Mix chilled seedless green grapes
with rich sour cream. Serve cold
and topped with freshly grated nut-
meg and brown sugar.

Arrange pork sausage patties over
creamed macaroni in a casserole.
Then bake until pork patties are
cooked and have added a delicious
flavor to the macaroni. Serve piping
hot.

Avoid skin forming on top of
hot cornstarch pudding by cover-
ing top of serving dish with a piece
of waxed paper while pudding
cools.

Keep patent leather bags shiny
and new looking by sponging with
soap suds. Then rinse with a damp
cloth and polish with a dry cloth.

**Paul Forged
Spiritual Armor
For Christians**

THE Apostle Paul, who was a
Christian in a Roman pagan
world dominated by power and
Roman conquering armies, did
not hesitate to draw effective
illustrations for Christian life
and conduct from the details of
happenings in that Roman world.

He compared the Christian life
to a race, and he laid great stress
upon running to win.

In imperial Rome, with its
dominance of the world, he saw
the material realization of a
similar dream of imperialism,
but his dream was of a spiritual
imperialism of a world complete-
ly conquered by Christ and His
gospel.

In that sense Paul was an
imperialist, and the dream en-
shrined in the Lord's Prayer,
"Thy kingdom come; Thy will be
done on earth as it is done
in heaven," is still the dream and
prayer of Christians, though it is
still far from fulfillment.

That Roman world was one of
action, war, and conquest; and
in his spiritual world Paul saw
the Christian life and Christian
duty, individual and collective,
as demanding action, war, and
conquest.

The Christian's warfare was
against inward evils, temptations
and weaknesses from which Paul,
himself, was not immune.

But the foes of the Christian
were not all inward.

Against the forces of evil,
within and without, Paul called
for Christians, strong and well-
prepared.

What the Christian world of
today lacks is the Pauline sense
of the Christian warfare. We
tend to think of Christianity too
exclusively in terms of personal
character and conduct. What we
need is aroused and awakened
Christians, following a Son of
God, who goes forth to war,
and fully equipped with all the
available spiritual weapons for
offense and defense.

It's time wasted to whitewash a
character that couldn't be saved
even with a heavy coat of enamel.
