## NPS To Establish Natural History Museum In Dare

NAGS HEAD—A natural history museum with displays of the flora and fauna of the new Cape Hatteras National Seashore Recreation Area, along with minerals and different types of sands of the area will be established at the former Light House Keepers' residence near the base of Bodie Island Lighthouse. The plan for the museum includes a paved spur road leading from the link of highway between Nags Head and Oregon Inlet.

L. B. Coryell, architect of the Richmond office of the National Park Service has been here to develop plans for the converting of the residence structure into a museum building. He is no stranger on the Dare Coast as the replicas of the hanger and quarters building of the Wright Brothers of first flight fame were reconstructed at the actual site of the first flight on December 17, 1903. The Wright buildings are located near the base of Kill Devil Hill which is surrounded by the national monument erected to commemorate the famous brothers' achievement. The hanger and quarters building were formally

In addition to exhibit space, rest room facilities and outdoor blinds from which wildfowl and water birds in nearby waters may be observed, will be built. The project

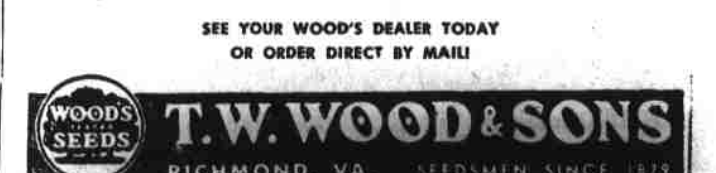
is expected to be completed by next summer.
