## PARENT PROBLEMS

### Should Parents Sit Up Till Youth Comes Home?

SHOULD you stay up till your teen-age son or daughter comes in at night? When this child comes home should you question and cross-question him or her? If you do stay up, what is your purpose? Do you want to ascertain the time the child comes in? Do you assume you could not get this information otherwise?

Is your chief reason to find out if the youth has done something of which you would not approve? Do you suppose that questioning guarantees getting all the facts? If you did not approve of the activities related by your child, what could you do about it?

One mother wrote the following letter about such problems:

"Dear Dr. Myers: I trust in children, especially my oldest child, is, though he doesn't have much to say when he returns home.

Straight to bed

"If I am up when he comes home, usually by midnight at the latest, sometimes he'll talk, sometimes he'll go straight to bed. If I'm up I will ask him if he has had a good time.

"Do you think I should stay up and then ask him a lot of questions? He has said, 'Mom, I know you trust me. Keep on trusting me.'"

As I told this mother, you are wrong to make a point of staying up and waiting for your son to come home. Even so, your son, judging from his remarks about your trusting him may feel that you ask some prying questions when you do stay up.

It's wise to wait until the next

morning, even later, before asking him if he had a good time. This practice may reassure him of your trustfulness.

**Sleep and Safety**

You probably have an understanding about the time he is to be in the house at night. He needs a certain amount of sleep and safety must be considered, too. Whether he drives or rides with others, traffic near or after midnight is usually more hazardous than earlier.

When you observe incidents that prove his dependability in various situations, be generous with your approvals.

At companionable times, you or Dad might briefly express your wishes about what he should or shouldn't do while away from home. Anticipate some of the temptations he may face. Be careful not to make your suggestions sound like commands. It might be wise and prudent to express such wishes just as he is about ready to go out for the evening or on a date.

**Family Conversations**

Such good suggestions can be most effective if you enjoy companionship with the boy, and he is able to carry on easy conversation with the family.

These same principles apply to any daughter and her parents.

Let us aim to guide our children in behavior and ideas while they are home in a family atmosphere so pleasant that they will, on their own accord, strive to do what they know is right when away from us.

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
