## Ranger Wells Warns Get Burning Permit

The state-wide law relating to the burning of brush within 500 feet of any woodland area without first obtaining a permit to do so will be rigidly enforced, according to County Ranger Eugene C. Wells. This law reads as follows: "Starting fires within five hundred (500) feet of areas under protection of State Forest Service — It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to start or cause to be started any fire or ignite any material in any of the areas of woodlands under the protection of the State Forest Service or within five hundred (500) feet of any such protected area, during hours starting at midnight and ending at 4:00 p. m. without first obtaining from the State Forester or one of his duly authorized

agents a permit to start or cause to be started any fire or ignite any material in such above mentioned between the first day of October and the first day of June, inclusive. No charge shall be made for the granting of said permits. During periods of hazardous forest fire conditions the State Forester is authorized to cancel all permits and prohibit the starting of any fires in any of the woodlands under the protection of the State Forest Service or within five hundred (500) feet of any such protected area. Any person, firm or corporation violating in any of the provisions of this act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not more than fifty dollars (\$50.00) or imprisoned for a period of not

more than thirty (30) days." Burning permits may be obtained here in Duplin County, Ranger Wells said, by contacting any of the following: G. R.
