New Suit Filed In Goldsboro Blast

Another suit growing out of the Edwards-Jernigan explosion in Goldsboro on April 12 was filed in Wayne Superior Court recently by Mrs. Lila D. Homes, executrix, asking \$100,000 damages for the death of her husband, Troy E. Homes, employe of Edwards-Jernigan Company.

Named as defendants in the suit are Goldsboro Gas Company and Town and County Gas Company.

Homes, one of five persons killed in the explosion, was found buried in the basement of the furniture store, where the explosion allegedly originated.

The complaint alleges that there was situated near the Edwards-Jernigan building cellar a gas main and a number of pipes installed for the purpose of furnishing artificial gas to customers of the gas company and that the type of gas supplied was the type that upon escape would settle in any part of the cellar.

The plaintiff charges that the defendants were aware of "obsolete, deteriorated, rusty pipes filled with gas furnished by Goldsboro Gas Company, which were leaking gas, and nevertheless the defendants negligently failed to correct and remedy this defect."

The gas company is charged further with continuing to use its "obsolete, worn-out pipe system" and that it "neglected to inspect and test the pipe system maintained at Edwards-Jernigan, even though it had knowledge of the leaking gas." Attorney for the plaintiff is Paul Edmundson.
