

TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS

Pedestrian traffic accidents - which claimed 244 Tar Heels last year - represents one of the traffic safety engineer's biggest headaches. City after city, following careful study of the traffic picture, has turned its guns first on pedestrian accidents. Why? Because the average urban area finds that pedestrian deaths make up a large percent of its total traffic fatalities.


From local studies made of the pedestrian accident picture, the following facts emerge:

- 1. The elderly pedestrian consistenly appears most often as a traffic fatality, with some areas finding as high a ratio as two out three pedestrians killed aged 50 or older.

In summing up, the pedestrian in the greatest danger is the elderly man who has never driven a car, and his dangerous walking hours are those in dusk or darkness. -


