Unless he is reassured by the attitude of the people around him and by learning the facts about his isease, he will have to relieve the stress of intense anxiety in some way. He may do this by giving up

He may display childish irritability, tantrums, and unreasonable de-mands. Other patients may react as submissive, well-behaved children They may become over-dependent on the doctor and on receiving treatment, and resist any effort to break the bonds. Still others release their anxiety by becoming hostile and aggressive, and try to hurt them selves and others. The type of reaction, of course, depends on the basic and sometimes hidden personality traits the sick person brings to hi new situation,

By facing the psychologic probems of illness frankly and with sympathetic understanding, the family of the TB patient can make an important contribution to his welfare. Satisfying his mental and emotional needs can be just as impor tant as performing the mechanical tasks of nursing.


