## Census Bureau Seeks Aid Of Farmers Here

Wayne farmers are being asked to cooperate with the Bureau of the Census Department of Commerce in the 1954 Census of Agriculture which is now under way.

This census is the 16th in a series of nation wide farm canvasses since the first farm census in 1940, over 100 years ago.

The Census questionnaire is designed to collect information about the number and size of farms, tenure, acreage of land in various uses, crops harvested, livestock inventory and production, expenditures for selected items, inventory of selected facilities and equipment, irrigation, conservation practices, farm value, mortgage debt, and cash rent.

Regional variations of the questionnaire will be used so that inquiries about crops, for instance, will be limited in each area to the crops common in that area. On an average, each farmer will be asked about 100 questions, many of which can be answered by checking "yes" or "no".

The Census of Agriculture is taken at five-year intervals to provide reliable and up-to-date statistical information about the more than five million farms on which a Nation of more than 142 million people depend for food and raw materials for the manufacture of goods. In large part, the efficiency of American agriculture depends on this information.

The data provides the foundation for the entire structure of the Nation's agricultural statistics.

The Federal government, Congress and the executive agencies use the information to develop and adminis-

ter farm programs.

Crop and livestock reporting services and other statistical activities of the United States Department of Agriculture, which provide estimates on farm industry trends that guide farmers, the government and others in their decisions, depends on beneficial data provided by the census.

State and local agencies, farm organizations and others serving the farmer use the census data in their analyses of the farm situation in their areas.
