A Very Old And Respected Colored Citizen Died Here Wednesday, Dec. 1 Services Held From First Baptist Church

Civic, Educational and Religious Leader passed at her home here, Wednesday afternoon.

Mrs. Julia Hussey Kenan the wife of the late Toney Kenan departed this life December 1st, 1954 at 1:00 o'clock.

Funeral services were conducted by the Rev. J. M. Mallett, pastor of the First Baptist Church of which she was a life long member.

She was one of the oldest civic leaders of this community and served as a mother and great leader to both young and old alike.

She was born in Duplin County and became a member of this church at an early age.

She was a devoted mother not only to her children but to other children and families as well. Most every one called her mother or grand mother. She was always willing to help out with any problems.

She realized she was nearing the top. In the house she would sing in her own way and rejoice in the Spirit clapping her hands and singing songs she learned long ago.

On Tuesday night she felt she had reached the last mile of her journey and was ready to pass away.

She is survived by nine children thirty seven grandchildren, forty grand children and a host of relatives and friends.

Palbearers were friends of out of town families. Burial was in the

family cemetery one hundred yards from the church.

"Knowing of the interest of the many clubs and church groups in bringing Christmas cheer to many citizens of Duplin County who are

unable to provide adequately for themselves and their families, the Duplin County Welfare Department would like to offer its cooperation in whatever project any club or group may undertake along this line," says Mrs. Taylor, Superintendent of Public Welfare.

There are many persons in this county who, through no fault of their own, will not be able to buy the things that are associated with a good Christmas. There are children, the aged and infirm and persons who are totally and permanently disabled who receive aid through your county department of public welfare. The amount of aid given, however, is inadequate and provides nothing for the "extras" that make Christmas a special occasion.

There are others in the county who are not eligible for public assistance but whose resources are so limited that unless they receive some aid, Christmas will mean very little to them. Toys for children or a little money with which to buy their own Christmas cheer would be especially welcome. Many men and women in the sanatorium and State Hospital will have no Christmas cheer except that provided through the generosity of each club. There are boys and girls in training schools who are looking forward to Christmas. We hope they will not be disappointed. Perhaps some group will help these folks have a happy Christmas.
