TODAYS Menu Some Vegetable Ideas From Foreign Countries

NEXT installment of our fresh vegetable cookery in foreign climes takes us first to South Africa, where many a housewife likes to serve a Fresh Vegetable Rarebit, a nice Lenten choice, indeed.

To prepare 6 servings, slice thin 2 medium onions and saute in 1/4 c. butter. Add 1/2 c. finely chopped green pepper, 3 c. sliced tomatoes, 3 tsp. salt, 1/2 tsp. black pepper, 1/2 tsp. sugar, 1/4 tsp. ground nutmeg and 2 1/2 lbs. white vinegar. Cook until tender, stirring occasionally. Blend in 3 tsp. chopped chives, 3 tsp. chopped parsley and 1/2 c. grated Parmesan type cheese; cook 2 min. Stir in 6 well-beaten eggs. Cook slowly until done, about 2 or 3 min., stirring mixture constantly.

Serve on buttered toast, with a garnish of parsley and paprika.

Finland Turnip Dish From Finland, comes Lantula-sikko, Turnip Casserole.

To serve 8, combine 2 c. cooked and mashed yellow or white turnips, 3 lbs. butter, 1/2 cup sugar, salt, 1/16 tsp. ground black pepper, 1/4 c. soft bread crumbs and 1 beaten egg.

Turn well-blended mixture into a buttered 1 qt. casserole. Top with 1/4 c. soft bread crumbs mixed with 1/2 tsp. butter, melted. Bake at 350° F. 30 min., or until brown.

Norway has a delicious way of fixing spinach that might even convert spinach-haters.

To serve 4, wash 1 1/2 lb. fresh spinach. Place in a saucepan with 2 tsp. boiling water and tsp. salt. Cook, covered, until tender, about 5 min.

Drain spinach, reserving water for later use. Chop spinach fine. Melt 2 tsp. butter, blend in 2 tsp. flour, 1/2 tsp. salt and 1/4 tsp. black pepper. Stir in 1/2 c. spinach water and 1/2 c. light cream or top milk. Cook until of medium thickness. Add chopped spinach. Serve hot.

Vegetables from Arabia Arabia sends us Kathir Mashakly Muthabga Besat, fresh vegetables baked in oil.

For 6-8 servings, remove seeds from 2 medium-sized sweet red peppers and cut peppers in slices 1/4 inch thick. Place in a 1 1/2-qt. casserole in alternating rows with 3/4 c. thinly sliced onions, 3 c. thinly sliced fresh tomatoes and 1/4 c. soft bread crumbs.

Combine 3 tsp. olive oil, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/2 tsp. black pepper and 1/4 tsp. minced garlic. Pour over all.

Cover. Bake 30 min. at 350° F. Remove cover. Top with another 1/4 c. soft bread crumbs. Bake 15 min., or until crumbs are brown. Serve with one lb. cooked noodles.
