GERMAN CROQUETTES WITH MUSTARD SAUCE

2 cups (16-oz. can) sauerkraut
1/2 cup minced onion
1/2 pound frankfurters
3 eggs
2 cups cooked rice
1 cup grated cheddar cheese
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
2 tablespoons water
1 cup fine dry crumbs
Drain sauerkraut thoroughly, pressing out as much of the juice as possible. Put sauerkraut, onions, and frankfurters through the food grinder, using a medium blade. Beat two of the eggs slightly. Add sauerkraut and frankfurter mixture, rice, cheese, salt, and pepper; mix thoroughly. Shape into 12 croquettes, using about 1/2 cup for each. Combine remaining egg and water; beat slightly. Roll each croquette in crumbs, then dip in egg mixture and roll again in crumbs. Fry in deep hot fat (375°F.) until golden brown, about 3 minutes. To make sauce, combine 1/2 cup salad dressing, 1/2 cup cream, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, and 3 tablespoons prepared mustard. Heat over boiling water. Serve over the hot croquettes. Yields six servings.

AOC Seeks Young Men For Training
A recent change in requirements has resulted in an immediate need for Aircraft Observer Aviation Cadets, according to Sgt. C. T. Jernigan, local Air Force recruiter. The Air Force hopes to secure a number of fully qualified observer aviation cadets before the end of February. Those men who qualify can expect placement in a flight observer class as soon as processing is completed. The observer program includes training in such specialties as navigation, meteorology, electronics, engineering and bombardment. Observe aviation cadets are given approximately one year of the finest training anywhere and upon graduation they will receive commissions as second lieutenants, Sgt. Jernigan added. They will then begin a three year tour of active service with pay over \$5,000 a year. The qualifications for aircraft observer aviation cadet training are similar to pilot aviation cadet requirements; applicants must be between the ages of 19 and 26 1/2, high school graduates, single, male citizens, and in excellent physical condition. Young men interested in applying for Aircraft Observer Cadet training should contact Sgt. Jernigan, located at the Court House in Kenansville each Monday.
