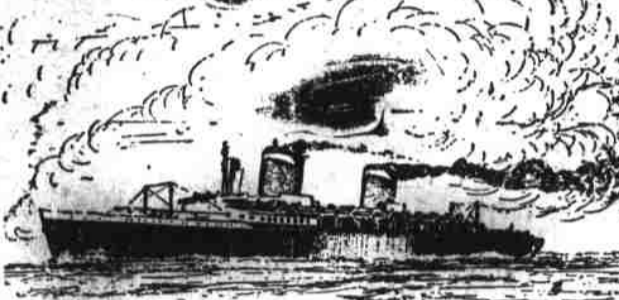
Circle 2 Meets Grove Church
