Something New In Rose Feeding Answer To Many Rose Fanciers Food Problems

For many years rose fanciers have shown a marked preference for plant food mixtures containing natural organic materials such as cottonseed meal or tankage. This preference was based on the belief, now disproven, that these organic materials very slowly decomposed in the soil, providing a gradual release of their nutrients, mainly nitrogen. The desirability of gradual nitrogen release for roses, as well as for many other plants, is unquestioned but natural organic materials, once the soil has warmed up, decompose at a rapid rate and exhibit little or no superiority in their plant food release rate from

regular chemical sources of nitrogen in plant foods.

It remained for the Plant Food Division of Swift and Company to develop a plant food for roses with truly controlled nutrient release. This new product which will appear this spring under the name "VIGORO COMPLETE ROSE FOOD" contains its nitrogen in four different form of varying rates of availability, plus two sources of potash and of phosphorous. In addition to nitrate and ammonia nitrate and ammonia nitrogen, there are also two types of ureaformaldehyde, one water soluble, the other insoluble. These latter materials constitute superior replacements for the natural organic materials used in specialty rose foods up until this

time. The four types of nitrogen provide a degree of extended nutrient availability unique in the field.

The new product developed as an outgrowth of the extended research that went into the new lawn food introduced by Swift & Company in 1955—The two plant foods are the only ones available to the gardener public providing the advantages of controlled nitrogen release in complete plant food form.
