Dean Mt. Olive College Dies

A. C. Lovelace, 66, who joined the faculty at Mount Olive College as acting dean last month, died suddenly of a heart attack near Charlotte Friday afternoon.

Mr. and Mrs. Lovelace were on their way to their home in Forest City to spend the week end and had a flat tire near Charlotte. Mr. Lovelace got out to change the tire and was stricken with a heart attack.

He is survived by his wife and two sons, Austin, a professor at Garrett Seminary, Evinston, Ill., and Mark, a professor at Southeastern Seminary, Wake Forest.

Mr. Lovelace was formerly dean of Wingate Junior college and had been a member of the faculty of Coker college, Hartsville, S. C., and High Point college. For a number of years he was principal and principal supervisor in the North Carolina public school system.

He received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Wake Forest college, and his Master of Education from Duke university and had taken post graduate studies at the University of North Carolina.

Funeral services were held Wednesday morning at 11 o'clock from the Pleasant Hill Baptist Church near Ruherfordton. A group of students represented the college at the services.
