Wallace-Rose Hill Wins Both Tourney Divisions All Tournament Selections Are Made

Wallace-Rose Hill's basketball teams took both the boys and girls ournament championship in Duplin County last Friday night. This marked the first time in four years that one school has tak-en both the boys and girls champ-ionship. Beulaville did it last in 1963.

Nancy Wells scored 35 points for the winners while Judy Carr was second with 18 tallies. But for the night's work, Lanier was top scorer with 43 points. The final score vas 60-55




