High Point to Accept Cliffs Park For North Carolina

A distinguished industrialist and civic leader will accept the memorial marker to the late Lionel Well at Cliffs of Neuse State Park. He is Amos R. Kearns of High Point who will receive the marker on behalf of the state of North Carolina.

The exercises will be held at Cliffs of Neuse State Park, 14 miles southeast of Goldsboro on Sunday, June 9, at 5:30 p.m. Mr. Kearns is chairman of the parks committee of the Board of Conservation and Development.

The public is invited to the exercises at which Dr. Frank P. Graham will be speaker. Dr. Graham is one of the nation's best known philosophers and educators. He is completing his seventh year as mediator for the United Nations for Pakistan and India.

Dr. Graham's term as UN mediator is nearing an end and there is a growing movement in North Carolina, to have him return to the state and rejoin the faculty of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. He won the love and esteem of students of the University first as teacher and then as president of the Consolidated Uni-

The association was organized by the Advisory Committee of Cliffs of Neuse State Park set by the Goldsboro Chamber of Commerce. Mr. Kearns is secretary - treasurer of the Crown Hosiery Mills of High Point. He is a graduate of Duke University and a member of the board of trustees and the executive committee of that board of Duke University. He has served as mayor of his city for several years and as president of the Rotary club there.

The Advisory Committee of the Park, Frank Seymour, chairman, acceded to a wide popular demand that a marker be placed at the Cliffs commemorating the work of the late Mr. Well in bringing the park into being. The brief exercises will be held at the Cliffs overlook. Mr. Moseley Davis of Mt. Olive, whose family gave land for the perpetual green view from the park across Neuse river, will preside.
