Thomas Rogers Named New Chief Of Police In Faison; Murray Byrd New County Deputy

Thomas A. Rogers, 51, was sworn in as chief of police in Faison Tuesday by Mayor L. D. Groome. Rogers, who was formerly chief of police of Warsaw for eleven years, has replaced R. M. Byrd, who has been appointed a Duplin County Deputy Sheriff.

Rogers said today that he has held various positions since the job as chief of police in Warsaw five years ago, but is looking forward to his new assignment.

Rogers is presently living in Warsaw, but will make his home in Faison as soon as a suitable home can be located.

Byrd has already taken a position with the Duplin County Sheriff's office. He will continue to make his home in Faison.

Before resigning the position as chief of police Byrd had served for 22 years. He began working with the department in 1935.

1 Model KX-21, type, centralnear X-ray unit, consisting of transformer unit, control stand, Model 60-2 tube stand with ceiling to floor rails, Model HRT-111 1.5 - 1.5 rotating anode tube unit, shockproof high voltage cables, pair, 15' long.

All equipment is to be installed in the County Health Department, and the Photoregen unit now owned by the Health Department is to be dismantled, moved, from Duplin General Hospital, Inc., and installed in the County Health Department. Specifications are on file with the County Health Department.

That bonds of Duplin County, North Carolina, be issued, pursuant to The County Finance Act, as amended, in an amount not exceeding \$16,000 for the purpose of refunding a like amount of the principal of valid subsisting bonded indebtedness of said County which was originally incurred by the Board of Commissioners (as an administrative agent of the State in providing a State system of public schools) for maintaining the constitutional six months' school term and is evidenced by the following:

\$5,000 School Bonds, dated April 1, 1928, maturing April 1, 1937, and \$2,000 School building Bonds, dated June 1, 1946, maturing June 1, 1968.

That a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of the \$82,000 bonds herein authorized, when due, shall be annually levied and collected.

That the holders of the \$82,000 bonds herein authorized shall be subrogated to all the rights and powers of the holders of the indebtedness refunded thereby.

That a statement of the County debt has been filed with the clerk and is open to public inspection.

That this order shall take effect upon its passage and shall not be submitted to the voters.

The foregoing order has been introduced and a sworn statement has been filed under the County Finance Act showing the assessed valuation of the County to be \$39,850,642.00 and the net debt, including the proposed bonds, for school purposes to be \$264,000.00 and for other than school purposes to be \$1,243,000.00. A tax will be levied for the payment of the proposed bonds

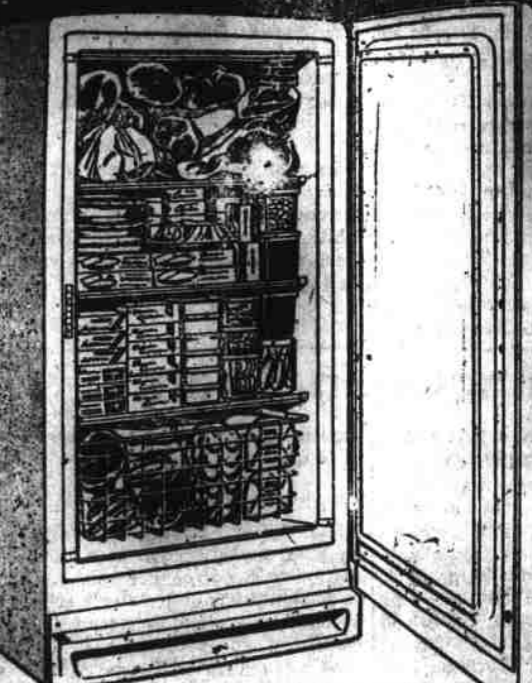
