A dinner meeting of Duplin Negro Division of the Boy Scouts of America was held last night at Pearsall's Food Bar with W. L. Pines presiding.

Cancer Of Head And Neck Will Be The Subject Of A Scientific Session Soon

Cancer of the Head and Neck will be the subject of a scientific session for physicians and dentists to be held October 29, 300 p.m. at the Walter Hotel, Raleigh.

The program is a feature of the annual meeting of the American Cancer Society, N. C. Division, and is sponsored by the Medical and Scientific and Professional Education committees of the Society in conjunction with the cancer committees of the Medical Society of N. C. and the N. C. Dental Society.

Speakers for the session include Marvin E. Chapin, Jr., D.D.S., professor and chief of Oral Surgery, University of North Carolina Dental School, talking on "Cancer of the Oral Cavity As Seen by the Dentist"; John V. Blady, M. D., professor of Head and Neck Surgery, Temple University School of Medicine, Philadelphia, whose topic is "Di-

agnosis and Handling of the Patient Who Presents Himself with a Lump in the Neck". Following the panel, speakers, and audience will participate in a discussion period.

Both will be presented at the University of North Carolina Dental School, talking on "Cancer of the Oral Cavity As Seen by the Dentist"; John V. Blady, M. D., professor of Head and Neck Surgery, Temple University School of Medicine, Philadelphia, whose topic is "Diagnosis and Handling of the Patient Who Presents Himself with a Lump in the Neck".
