Veterans Day Will Be Celebrated in a Big Way in Warsaw Monday

This is the 37 consecutive year of Warsaw's celebration of the Armistice Day signing, November 11, 1918.

The big festivities have been going on all week in Warsaw and will be culminated Monday with the main features.

The parade will begin at 2:30 p.m. Monday, according to George West, publicity chairman. He points out, however, that all floats, marching units and bands are requested to be in line not later than 1:30 p.m.

West said the parade will form just north of the railroad depot on highway 117-A north.

It will make a left turn at the depot and go one block to 117, Chelly Street. It will then make a right turn and continue to the junction of the Kenansville and Wilmington highways. There the parade will turn right and go one block. The units will then travel the east side of the railroad back to the starting point.

This year the reviewing stand will be located on Railroad Street between Hill Street and Pollock Street.

All Gold Star mothers in the Warsaw area are being invited to sit on the reviewing stand along with mayors of the various towns in the Warsaw locality and other dignitaries.

The U. S. Army will have a static display across from the Reviewing stand and will include some of the missiles in the Army's arsenal.
