quotas - with penalties on 'excess tobacco marketed, acreage allotments, and price supports at 90 percent of parity will be in effect for the 1959 crop.

"On the other hand if more than one-third of the voters disapprove quotas, then, for marketing purposes during the 1959-60 marketing year, there would be no marketing quotas, no penalties on 'excess' tobacco, no acreage allotments, and no price supports for the 1959 fluecured tobacco crop. In that event another referendum would be held next year on marketing quotas for the next three crops of flue-cured
