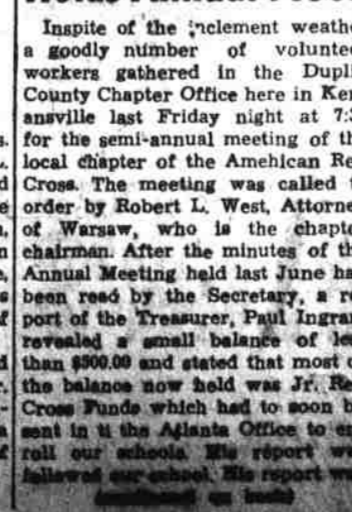
Workshop On Child Guidance Held
