Forests Are Being Planted In South At Rate Of One Acre Every Four Minutes
 Forests are being planted in the South today by the pulp and paper industry at the rate of one acre every four minutes.

H. J. Malberger, general manager of the Southern Pulpwood

Conservation Association, revealed here today this reforestation record has been established during the past 10 years when the southern pulp and paper industry has planted and distributed over one and one-quarter billion seedlings, with about one-fourth of them going to private landowners.

The pulp and paper industry is now the fifth largest industry in the nation, and 70 percent of the postwar increase in the industry has been in the South. The use of pulpwood in the South has increased 132% during the past decade.

Fifty to sixty percent more pulpwood will be needed by 1967, Mr. Malberger pointed out.

The industry will observe Pulp and Paper Day throughout the Southeast on April 15 to focus public attention on the economic importance to the region of the pulp and paper industry, its role in the South's modern agricultural development, and the opportunities more productive forests offer the years ahead.

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
