How To Quiet Your Home



There are four basic methods or ways to reduce noise in the home. The first is to use acoustical materials on the ceiling to absorb noise and keep it from bouncing between walls, ceilings and other smooth surfaces. (2) Use mechanical door closers and weatherstripping around doors to stop the spread of noise from one room to another. (3) Utilize drapes, upholstered furniture, resilient or "soft" flooring and floor coverings to absorb noise. (4) Place resilient mountings under appliances that may cause vibration noise. The hostess, Miss Ann Crawford, entertained about forty people at her apartment on Smallwood Drive.

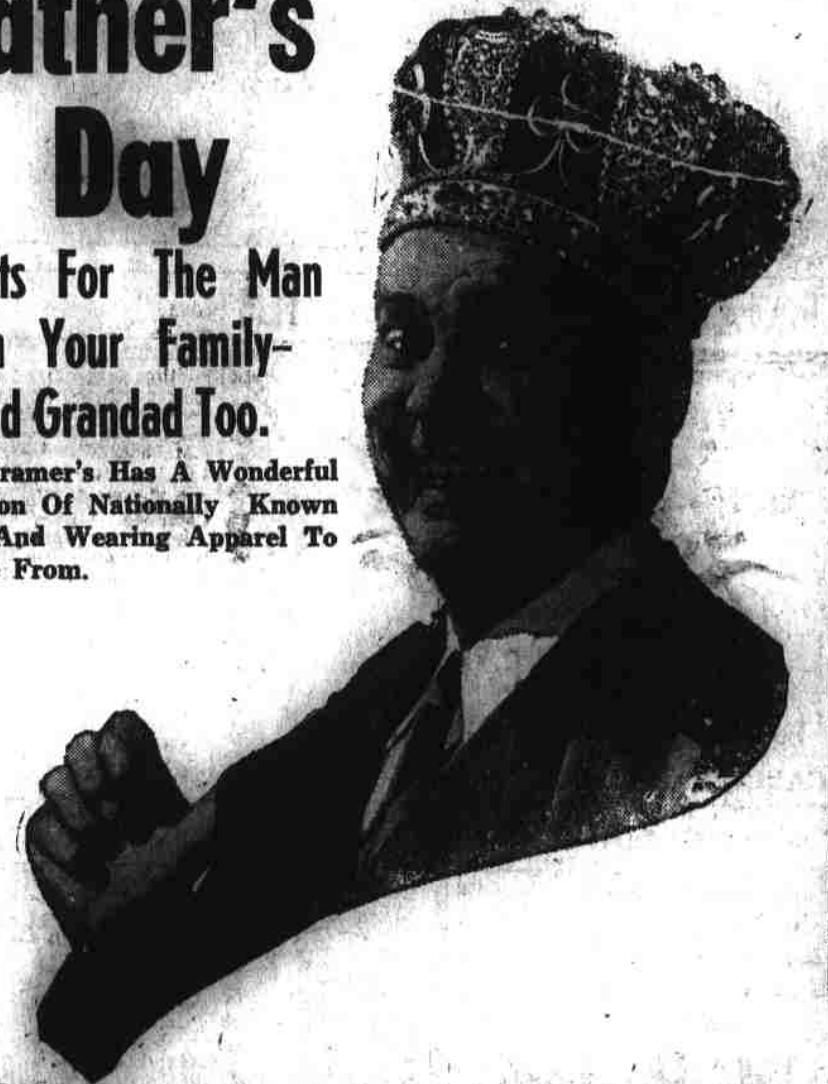

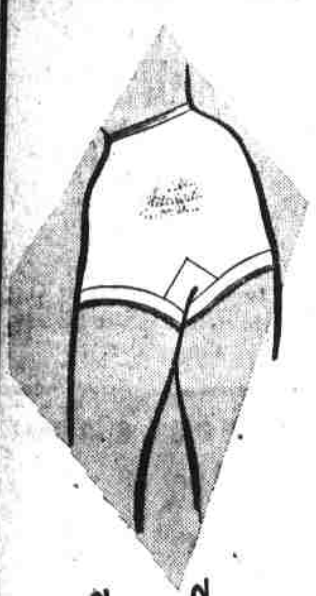
