PROSPECT TOBACCO CROP EXCELLENT
Must MUST MUST
A general survey of the tobacco crop in this section at this time shows the following:
Scattered showers, interspersed with good ground soaking rains on May 26, May 30, June 3 and June 10 have provided ample moisture for the tobacco crop to this date.
The effect of these weather conditions upon the tobacco crop in our section have been as follows:
1. An ample supply of strong healthy plants and a minimum of disease, both in the plant beds and in the fields, have provided nearly perfect stands of tobacco in most of the fields.
2. The crop in this section is uniform, healthy and has good color and appearance. The young plants have developed an excellent root system and are now beginning to take a nice spread.
3. At the time of our last report the crop in this section was about 10 days to two weeks late compare with last year's crop. However, since the crop has been transplanted into the fields the growing conditions have been good and the young plants have grown very rapidly.
This has tended to offset some of the lateness in the development of the crop. It is, in my opinion, only about one week later than last year's crop, at this time.
4. With favorable weather conditions from now on, the prospects for the tobacco crop, in this section, this year, are excellent.
