At a demonstration at Magnolia, he pointed out that it is absolutely wrong for farmers to 'heep row" sweet potatoes when harvesting. Any bruise will show up and the market price will be decreased. He also stressed the improtance of having a full pack in order to keep the potatoes from rubbing each other in transit to market.

"When you harvest sweet potatoes you should wear gloves and place each potato in the basket - not throw it or drop it Grady High School. in the basket Covington said.
