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Tigers Host To Strong North Duplin Friday In Homecoming Game

While Trying To Halt Abductors Foster Mother Gets Bad Injuries

Mr. Cagle Houston suffered severe leg bruises and was taken to Bower Clinic in Pink Hill for treatment when she was dragged about 72 feet down a road on Wednesday afternoon while trying to stop a car in which her adopted daughter apparently was abducted by the child's parents.

An alert was immediately ordered by State Highway Patrol for her brother, Stacy Brice Ransom of Fayetteville, on charges of hit-and-run driving resulting in personal injuries and kidnapping.

According to reports, the girl Mary Catherine Houston, age 3, has been cared for by Mrs. Houston and her husband since she was born, as Ransom and his wife were separated before the birth of the child, and adoption papers have been taken out. Officers said that Ransom his wife and brother-in-law picked up the girl at the Houston's Store on the Beulaville Road.

Mrs. Houston ran to the moving car and while trying to stop the kidnappers, she was dragged along the road until she fell off the vehicle and witnesses say that the back wheels of the car ran over both her legs. The car was a 1958 or 54 Chevrolet with Oklahoma license plates.

Ransom was not known to have any connections in Oklahoma, but officers thought the car may have belonged to his father-in-law.

Last inquiry from the Sheriff office reported that the abductors have not been found as yet.

Roundup Camporee To Be October 24-26

Farmers Will Be Able To Vote Monday December 15 On Tobacco Referendum

Some 250,000 fule-cured tobacco farmers in North and South Carolina will be given an opportunity December 15 to vote in a referendum on continuation for another three years (1959-60-61) the 10-cent per acre assessment to promote export markets for their product. The referendum date was announced today by A. C. Edwards, chairman of Tobacco Associates Board of Directors.

In its 11-year history Tobacco Associates, a non - government, non - profit organization representing all fule-cured interests from the producer to the consumer, has taken the promotion of overseas outlets for the fule-cured crop as its primary goal.

In the December referendum however, growers will be given an opportunity to vote on whether they desire to increase the assessment for the purpose of expanding export promotion activities and include the promotion of domestic markets.

Some Boy Scout To Win Round Trip To Switzerland

Some Boy Scout with a flair for writing a convincing 100-word essay will win a fully paid round-trip air flight and next week's visit to Switzerland next July, it was announced by Bruce M. Boyers, Scout executive of the Tuscarora Council of the Boy Scouts of America.

The contest is sponsored by the American Society, For Friendship with Switzerland and BOY'S LIFE, the monthly magazine for all boys published by the Boy Scouts of America.

In his essay of 100 words or less on "Why I would Like to Visit Switzerland as a Scout," the winner will tell how he proposes to build better understanding between young people of Switzerland and the United States.

Entries will be judged on the basis of understanding world friendship in general, and specifically between young people of both nations.

The contest was inspired by the October Boy Scouts theme, "World Brotherhood."

Nearly eight million boys are Scouts in sixty-seven countries of the free world, plus seventy-four geographic subdivisions that are protectorates or colonies. There is also a United Nations Troop composed of sons of United Nations personnel in New York.

Swiss-made watches will be presented to the 6 runners-up to the winner.

Entries sent to the Boy's Life Switzerland Contest at New Brunswick, New Jersey, must be postmarked not later than midnight, November 13, 1958.

Funds Set Up For Paving Duplin Roads

The State Highway Commission has approved and set up funds for paving three county roads in Duplin County, by contract.

This work involves paving with 18 - foot wide sand asphalt, the following roads: two miles of Wallace and Teachey Road; two miles of Calico Bay Road; and 1.1 mile of Boney Road, for a total of 5.1 miles.

It is anticipated that work on these roads will be completed on or before June 1, 1959, at an estimated cost of \$27,105.80.

Once funds have been approved for similar projects, the money is encumbered until such time as the work is completed.

Retail Merchants Schools Friends

The retail merchants of North Carolina in the twenty-five year period from July 1, 1933, through June 30, 1958, collected in sales taxes \$831,512,641. That's hitting along toward a billion dollars. This money has been used almost entirely for education. Another item to remember is that the merchant must pay the sales tax whether he collects it or not. The State of North Carolina took over the school system 25 years ago and at the same time put on the taxes to support it and gave the retail merchants responsibility for collecting it. Education has no better financial friend in North Carolina than the merchant.

Revised Rulings On Food Handling Are In Effect

Included in the revised food-handling regulations are "Temporary Food Stands" are establishments operated by civic, church, clubs, or similar groups such as at fairs, carnivals, circuses, public exhibition, or other similar gathering for a period of one week or less. "Drink Stands" include drug stores, taverns, and similar places which do not serve food but use glasses. These places will be rated with a small grade card. All drug stores will either operate 100% single service, that being only paper service or come under the restaurant standards.

"Temporary Restaurants" are ones in connection with fairs, carnivals, etc. These have to meet the standards of the regular restaurants with the exception of walls, ceilings, or floors.

The revised regulations are more explicit as to the requirements. General penalties, as found in the score sheet are in the law where as before they were in the regulations. The regulations are in a more condensed form a result of leaving out the Public Health Reasons and Compliance.

The Health Department urges anyone which plans to go in the restaurant business or remodels or has any questions concerning the revised regulations to contact the Sanitarian.

Violations frequently observed in Duplin County are lavatories in kitchen, employees toilets, sufficient exhaust system, garbage wash pits, and the importance of contacting the Health Department before engaging in any type of operation as set forth.

We realize these added facilities can not be secured immediately but in order to meet the minimum standards the above will be necessary.

Sheriffs Officers Have Busy Night

It is reported, according to Sheriff Ralph Miller, that two other men were with O. Q. Lanier and Curtis Lanier at the time of their arrest but he did not know their full names.

New Rules And Regulations Which Govern Sewage Disposal In Effect

On October 1, new rules and regulations governing the disposal of sewage from any residence, place of business or place of public assembly went into effect.

The new rules and regulations were adopted by the North Carolina Board of Health, July 17, 1958, under authority of the General Statutes of North Carolina. A breakdown of the new rules and regulations is as follows:

(1) Residence - The term "residence" shall mean and include any private home, tenant house, hotel, motel, summer camp, labor work camp, trailer court, institution, or other places where people reside for any period of time. Under this provision, it means that an approved privy, one which is fly proof, can meet the approval of the County Sanitarian and thus conform to the letter of the law.

(2) Place of Business - The term "place of business" shall mean and include any store, warehouse, manufacturing establishment, place of amusement or recreation, filling station, office building, or other places where people work. In some towns where there is currently no sewerage system, a considerable amount of planning will be necessary in order to comply with the new rules and regulations. There are some communities throughout North Carolina which will find it very difficult to comply without a large expenditure for the construction of a sewerage system.

(3) Place of Public Assembly - The term "place of public assembly" shall mean and include fair grounds, auditoriums, stadiums, churches, camp grounds, theatres, and other places where people congregate for religious, educational, or recreational purposes.

The new rules and regulations which govern the disposal of sewage from any residence, place of business or place of public assembly has been released to all County Sanitarians throughout North Carolina over the signature of J. W. R. Norton, M. D., State Health Director
