### Edwards & Shackelford Explain Program

## Farm Bureau Drive Begins Nov. 3

"We farm people must organize to protect ourselves. We are becoming such a minority," stated Paul Shackelford as he spoke to representatives of the Duplin County Farm Bureau who met on Tuesday night in the Agriculture Building. A meeting was called by President Leroy Simmons for the kick-off of the Farm Bureau Drive for Duplin County for 1958. A dinner was served to the group at Jones Caf. before convening at the Agriculture Building to hear Paul Shackelford of Wayne County and Lon Edwards of the State Farm Bureau explain in a most enlightening way the aims and purposes of the N. C. Farm Bureau.

Shackelford stated that Duplin County has made a great contribution to the Farm Bureau. He also stated that one of our problems today is surplus. Pointing out that we operate under a system of freedom of choice in America with very high standards of living, the farm people will have to exercise their rights more to keep them in force. Farmers today have to be good business men. The farmers have a responsibility to feed the people of the United States. He pointed out that poultry and poul-

try producers are coming to the top in Duplin and in the state, and yet farmers are the only group of people who have allowed others to set prices on what they sell as well as they buy.

Shackelford and Edwards both praise the work of the tobacco stabilization program. But stressed the fact that an organization of farmers was very necessary, for they can do collectively what they can't do individually.

The cost of joining the Farm Bureau is only \$3.00. Of this \$3.00 the county receives \$1.50, the state \$2.50 and American Bureau \$1.00. The Farm Bureau's accomplishments are great, he pointed out. It has helped to establish Tobacco Stabilization Corporation; helped to establish Tobacco Association; helped establish Tobacco Growers Information Committee; helped organize Peanut Growers Association worked with very community group; and developed NCFB Mutual Insurance Company.

YET with all of these worthwhile advantages, out of an approximate 9000 farmers in Duplin County only about 1400 are members of the Duplin County Farm Bureau. Farmers in North Carolina need to wake up and stick together now more than ever.

## Romie L. Faison Fatally Shot

Romie Lee Faison, 29, Route 1, Warsaw, was killed Sunday at 8 p. m. in an argument with Hallie Smith, 43, Route 1, Negro of Route 1, Warsaw. The shooting occurred at the home of Elizabeth Smith 41, on highway 24 at the Duplin and Sampson county - line near Balfie.

Smith went to the Sampson County Sheriff's office in Clinton and turned himself in. He said that Faison had come to the Smith home to visit Mrs. Smith, and that he (Smith) had ordered the visitor away. During the argument, Smith reportedly picked up a .12 gauge shotgun and fired one fatal blast at Faison who was standing no more than nine feet away.

Upon arriving at the scene, officers learned that Mrs. Smith had gone to the home of a neighbor in search of a ride to Warsaw. She was later found in a Warsaw juke - joint.

She later reported that she and Smith were married, had separated in July, but that Smith still visited her often. Smith's story, however, was that they were not separated at all. The shooting is being investigated by the Sampson County Sheriff's Department.
