Sentences Given In Superior Court Now In Progress

Theodore Chambers Grady, 18-year-old white youth, has been sentenced to from three to five years in the State Prison for carnal knowledge of a four-year-old girl.

Grady was sentenced in Duplin Superior Court now being held in Kenansville with Judge C. L. Moore, presiding, Walter T. Britt is collector.

In other cases, Albert Daniel Dail was given a sentence of three to five years on a manslaughter charge in the death of Macey Hill. He was placed on three years probation. A charge of operating an automobile while intoxicated and possession of tax paid whiskey was not proved.

William G. Smith was given a total sentence of 18 months on the roads after being found guilty of passing five worthless checks coupled with a larceny count. The sentence was 30 days each on five worthless check counts and six months for larceny, to run consecutively.

A charge of forgery involved an old age assistance check three years ago.

The case against Norwood Lewis charging him with carnal knowledge and contributing to a minor's delinquency has been continued.

Thompson Announces Banks In County To Send 2 Young Farmers

North Carolina's bankers long ago learned that good investments are not limited to stock and bond treasury certificates or real estate.

In fact, for more than a decade, Tar Heel bankers won a national award every year because of their recognition of another all-important investment, a sound farm economy in North Carolina.

Each year, the North Carolina Bankers Association conducts a farm program which has won for the State's bankers national acclaim. This success of the program has been largely due to a committee of 100 bankers, one in each of these State's counties, who are appointed "County Key Bankers" by the state association.

The Key Banker for Duplin County is E. C. Thompson Senior Vice-President of Branch Banking & Trust Company.

This week, Mr. Thompson announced that banks in this county will send at least two young farmers to Raleigh in February for a two-week study of the latest developments in farm technology. All expenses of the young farmers will be paid by the local banks. The young men will attend classes at the School of Agricultural of North Carolina State College beginning February 2 and ending February 17.

A total enrollment of about 175 young farmers is expected for the two week period, called "the Annual Short Course in Modern Farming."

The course in farming is just one of the many agricultural projects sponsored annually by members of the North Carolina Bankers Association. The Association, as a result of its broad program, has won the national award for its activities for 14 straight years. This award is presented annually by the American Bankers Association to the State Association which conducted the best farm program during the preceding 12 months.

While in Raleigh, the young farmers will attend a banquet session of the annual Farm Credit Conference, also sponsored by Tar Heel bankers. Speaker at the banquet will be Ervin L. Peterson, Assistant Secretary of Agriculture.

When this year's course for young farmers has been completed, more than 1,000 young North Carolina farmers will have attended the classes over a seven-year period, all under the sponsorship of the banks of the State. Records show that about 25% of the young farmers, after attending the course, have changed their minds and decided to seek further agricultural education. Prior to attending these classes, all of the 25% had not planned to go to college.

Mrs. Stevens In Who's Who Of American Women

Fred Bond, named Man of the Year by the Progressive Farmer, and also assistant manager of the Stabilization Corporation was the speaker at the annual Farm Bureau meeting held in the Kenansville auditorium on Monday night of this week. Mr. Bond was well informed on the subject of tobacco spoke to a most interested group of about 150 farmers.

He stated that he wanted to be frank about the hopes for the coming year, but that things are getting to be really serious with respect to the price program because of the production of sorry tobacco. Even though the farmers have suffered cuts in tobacco acreage, they are now producing the same amount of tobacco on the cut acreage. This situation has flooded the market with an inferior quality.
