Mt. Olive College Ready To Accommodate Transferring Students

President W. Burkette Raper announced today that the schedule of Mt. Olive Junior College has been arranged to accommodate new and transferring students for the new terms which begins Wednesday, January 28.

This will be the first registration period held at Mount Olive since the College was formally accredited in November by the North Carolina College Conference and State Department of Education. Students entering the second semester will be able to begin a regular program of studies just at those who enrolled in September, President Raper disclosed. Both day and resident students are being accepted.

Present indications are that this year may be the largest mid-year registration. Mount Olive Junior College has had in its five years of operation. The accreditation of the College and the crowded condition of many senior colleges are responsible for this increase, Mr. Raper declared. Enrollment at Mount Olive Junior College has increased from 22 in 1934 to 147 for the fall semester.
