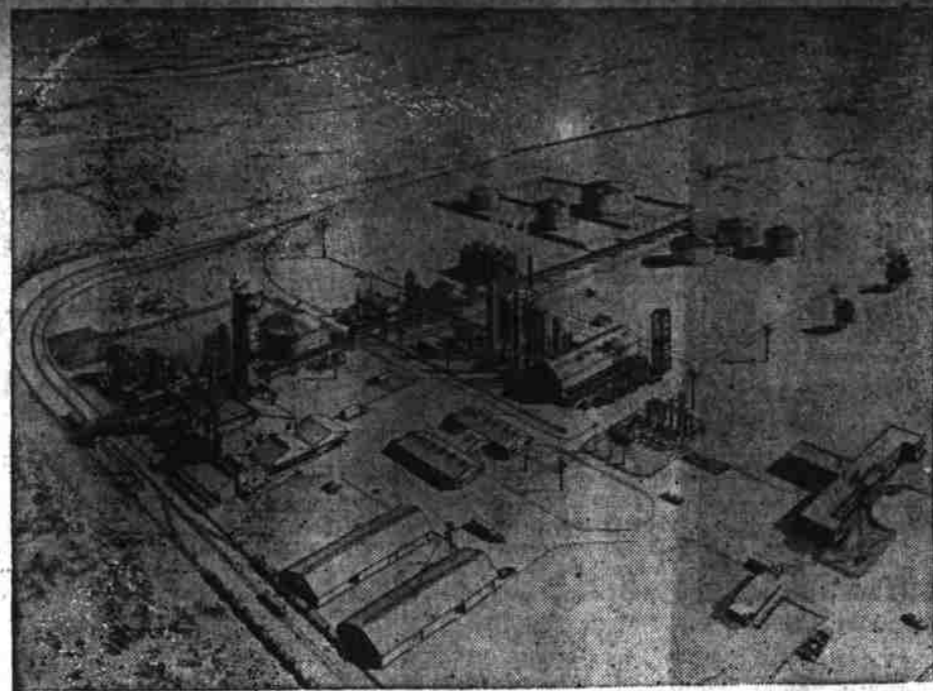

Senator Ellender To Speak Friday Farm Press Meet

U. S. Senator Allen J. Ellender (D-La.), chairman of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Forestry, will be the principal speaker at the 1950 N. C. Farm Press, Radio & TV Institute in Raleigh this week.

The Institute, designed to keep both daily and non-daily newspaper farm writers, radio and television farm broadcasters, up-to-date on the changing agricultural scene, begin with a banquet in the Sir Walter Hotel Friday (Feb. 20) at 7 p.m. Senator Ellender's talk will be a highlight of the banquet. A press conference with the Senator will follow the banquet.

Saturday, the reporters will assemble at N. C. State College's College Union building for technical sessions. Saturday discussions center around agriculture's

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Key Figures To Have Part In Farm Press Institute In Raleigh Feb. 20-21

Key figures from the field of farm communications will take part in the annual N. C. Farm Press, Radio and Television Institute in Raleigh Friday and Saturday (Feb. 20-21).

Jack P. Hankins, manager of radio station WELS, Kinston, and president of the N. C. Association of Broadcasters, will be on hand along with John I. Anderson, editor of The Transylvania Times, Brevard, and president of N. C. Press Association.

Some 20 other prominent members of the press, radio, television, magazine and public relations fields have a part in the Institute program.

The event this year will get under way with a banquet at Hotel Sir Walter Friday. U. S. Senator Allen J. Ellender (D-La.), chairman of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Forestry, will be the banquet speaker. Federal farm programs will come up for review in the current Congress and Ellender will play a key role in any new farm legislation.

Presentations of the Farm Bureau's first Distinguished Service Awards for Agricultural Reporting will be another highlight of the opening banquet.

Saturday the farm reporters and broadcasters will hear principal state agricultural leaders describe North Carolina's current agricultural situation. Program participants include David G. Weaver, director, N. C. Agricultural Extension Service; George Hyatt Jr., head of the department of animal industry at N. C. State College; Edward W. Glasener, head of the college's department of poultry science; Hank Wilkinson, assistant Extension Service editor; Bill Humphries, farm editor, The News and Observer; Bill LaRue, associate editor, The Progressive Farmer; Dick Stokes, farm director, WNCN-TV, Greenville;

A. C. Edwards, executive vice president, N. C. Farm Bureau; Joe Elliott, editor, The Progressive

The Institute, expected to attract its largest group this year, is sponsored by the N. C. Press Association, the N. C. Association of Broadcasters, the N. C. Farm Writers Association, and the Division of College Extension at State College. It is cosponsored by the Division of Agricultural Information at the college.

Courses will be offered in botany, chemistry, mathematics, physics and zoology. Each participant will be expected to take two courses. Instructors will be members of the Wake Forest faculty. There will be three visiting lectures. There also will be biological field trips and trips to industrial and scientific plants.

Applicants will be considered from throughout the Southeast. Preference will be given persons less than 60 years old, those who have no formal college instruction in science or mathematics in the past five years, those who have at least three years teaching experience and persons who have not previously attended such an institute. H. S. Science & Math Teacher Note

High school teachers of science and mathematics are being urged to apply for grants to attend a National Science Foundation Institute at Wake Forest College this summer.

The grant covers expenses for teachers attending the institute and also operational costs. The institute, which will begin June 15 and last six weeks, will be limited to approximately 60 teachers. Interested teachers are being urged to apply by Feb. 16.

Persons who are selected for grants will receive a stipend of \$450, a subsistence allowance of \$90 for each dependent up to four

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
