Why Excise Tax On Telephones?

Duplin County Subscribers Averaged \$14 in 1958

Telegraph Company paid \$1,800,00 services in 1908, W. Y. Vann, manger of the Warsaw Group disclosed today.

Te ephone service is taxed at the rate of 10% for federal excise tax purposes. Manager Vann said that the average payment per telephone subscriber in Duplin County and other Eastern North Carolina towns was \$14 during 1958.

Telephone service is the only household utility on which a fed eral excise tax is levied. The tele-

The excise tax on telephone service was intended, when adopted many years ago, to be a temporary wartime emergency tax but has never been removed. It was reduced to the 10% rate in 1954, Manager Vann pointed out.

"Telephone weers consider i an unfair and discriminatory tax because it singles out one segment of public - in fact, one segment of household utility users, who already bear their share of other federal state and local taxation. taxes are usually applied to such luxury items as furs, jew-eny, cosmetics liquor tobacco, cabaret bills, private cinb dues and the like.
