Vann said that with this new service telephone subscribers here will begin dialing many of their own long distance calls to points all over the country. For the first time residents of Warsaw and nearby towns will be able to span the nation with a few spins of their telephone

The establishment of a standardized, nationwide telephone numbering plan and intricate new equipment made D. D. D. possible and marks an important nilestone of communication progress, Vann pointed out.

Initially telephone users in Warsaw and adjacent areas may dial most of their own stationto-station calls to hundreds of points in North Carolina and the nation. Later, as telephone exchanges in other places are equipped ot receive Direct Distance Dialed calls, they will be added to the list of places that subscribers can dial.
