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Some Of Best Scientific Minds In U. S. Working To Learn What Causes Cancer

Some of the best scientific minds in the country - at least a thousand strong - are working in laboratories in almost every state to find out what causes cancer, and to put an end to the nation's number two disease killer. Their research, he explained, is financed by the American Cancer Society, whose annual Crusade has started here.

Medical Doctor termed research "the golden key which will unlock the mystery of cancer and ultimately end it as a scourge."

He described the research attack on cancer as "the greatest and costliest single undertaking in medical history."

Intensification of the research war against cancer is one of the purposes of the Society's 1956 Crusade. Impetus has been given to part of last week with relatives.

Medical Drs. said the victory against cancer, although the most spectacular case in point, was not won without the expenditure of great sums for research as well as for service.

From 1926 through 1956 there was more than \$468,000,000 in voluntary public support, plus millions of hours of labor contributed by volunteers. The Salk Vaccine was the result.

Because of the miracle of penicillin, another case he cited and which he termed "another research triumph," the death rate in a number of diseases has declined spectacularly. Penicillin came into general use in 1946. In the following two-year period, resulting from its general application, rheumatic fever mortality declined 74 per cent; pneumonia and influenza, 41 per cent; appendicitis, 70 per cent; syphilis, 71 per cent; acute nephritis, 64 per cent. There also have been sharp drops in the death rate due to other infections.


