Stream Levels Up Throughout State

North Carolinians didn't have to wait till May for one benefit from traditional April showers. Rains during the month brought stream levels up in all areas. The State Board of Water Commissioners said Thursday in its monthly water resources report.

Stream flow in the eastern Piedmont and Coastal Plain was about twice the median for the month, with major rises occurring during the second and third weeks, according to the report, which is based on information from the U. S. Geological Survey.

U. S. Weather Bureau records show that total precipitation for the month in the eastern Piedmont and Coastal Plain averaged about 6 inches. The one exception was in the extreme southeastern Coastal Plain, where the average was about 3.25 inches.

High Rock, Narrows, and Bridgewater reservoirs showed gains and at the end of the month stood at 96.7% of capacity, compared with 99.3% a year ago.

Stream flow in the western Piedmont was generally restored to median conditions and to somewhat above median conditions in the northern portions.

Frequent showers with accompanying minor rises and a medium stage rise on April 12 helped increase flows from deficiencies of February and March. Rainfall total of 5.01 inches for the month was recorded at Statesville.

In the mountain region, stream flow was about 15% above the median for the month, following deficiencies in February and March. Precipitation in the mountains averaged about 6 inches, 44% above the average. It ranged from about 9 inches at Rosman in the upper French Broad basin to about 4 inches at Chateau Dam in the Hiwassee River basin.

Producing High Quality Cotton Is The Secret To Improving Lint Industry

Producing high quality cotton — and preserving that quality until the bale reaches the spinning mill door — is a primary objective of the cotton industry.

The reason: quality is an important means of meeting competition from man-made fibers. The industry cotton quality extends from the field to mill, the National Cotton Council reports.

Researchers are exploring the potential that exists for building more quality and value into the cotton fiber through genetics and breeding. Many opportunities ex-

ist, they believe, for making the cotton plant a more efficient producer and for adapting it to practices that reduce production, harvesting, ginning, and utilization costs.

During 1933 two workshops were held to give cotton breeders an opportunity to analyze the effect of manufacturing process on the fiber and of the fiber on manufacturing processes.

Mechanical harvesting of cotton is increasing. This calls for continued training of people who operate these harvesters. Proper

operation and maintenance of the machines are necessary if cotton quality is to be preserved.

Tar-bottom pickacks, once a source of costly spots in cotton fabrics, became virtually extinct in 1933. There also has been an improvement in the condition of boxcars for shipping cotton and a reduction of the number of in-transit fires.

The industry also has launched a series of spinning-ginning tests. Purpose of the tests is to evaluate the effects of various ginning practices and equipment on fiber quality and processing performance and to provide cottons of known histories for basic fiber studies.
