For each 2 cups of mixed fruit dissolve 1 teaspoon Fruit-Freeze in 2 tablespoons water or fruit juice. Sprinkle over the fruit and toss well so that each piece of fruit is well coated. Peel melon and slice. Wash and hull strawberries. Wrap fruit in waxed paper. Store in refrigerator. When ready to serve, place the pineapple half on a platter; fill center with mixed sliced fruit and top with strawberry halves. Arrange melon slices and grapes on platter.
