Tobacco Variety Performance Survey Being Conducted In Duplin County

A Tobacco Variety Performance survey is being conducted in Duplin County to determine how various varieties compared in yield and value during 1959 on tobacco farms. As many farmers as possible are being contacted so that the information gathered will represent a sizeable portion of the tobacco grown in the county. Growers are being asked what total yield and value he received from each variety he grew in 1959. Cards are being sent to a representative group of growers in the county and the growers who receive cards are urged to fill out the card accurately and return it to the County Agent's office. Everyone who receives a card should send it in regardless of whether his yield is low, medium or high. This is essential if the summary of the variety data is to represent the actual performance of a given variety in the county and state. This information is also being accumulated by other counties, and a summary of the county, belt and State results will be available for growers to see as soon as it has been summarized.

Farm Income Tax School To Be Held In Area

A "Farm and Small Business Income Tax Short Course" will be taught at several points across North Carolina within the next few weeks in an effort to familiarize farmers, small business men and accountants with tax problems soon to come up. The short course is being sponsored by Department of Agriculture, Economics, N. C. State College, in cooperation with U. S. Internal Revenue Service, N. C. Department of Revenue, N. C. Society of Accountants, and Social Security Administration. For all of Eastern North Carolina, the meeting will be held in Greenville, November 23-24, at the Jarvis Memorial Methodist Church. Other meetings are set for: Asheville, November 30-December 1, George Vanderbilt Hotel; Charlotte, December 2-3, Army Reserve Armory; 1412 Westover Road; and Greensboro, December 7-8, Auditorium of Greensboro Division of Guilford College. An advance session will be held in Raleigh December 16-18. At the Raleigh meetings, instructors will assume that those attending this advance session will have considerable knowledge and experience in income tax filing.

She had several deep and painful wounds inflicted during the attack. The two men were arrested in Goldsboro by Patrolmen Raymond Evans and E. W. Merritt after Mrs. James told officers of the license no. on the get-away car.

Farmers Reminded To Return Weed Cards By Nov. 20

Times is drawing near. If you are one of those tobacco farmers in Duplin County who failed to return your tobacco marketing card to the Duplin County ASC Office, then you have only until the close of the office November 20 to get the job done. What happens if you continue to forget and fail to meet the November 20, deadline? You lose your tobacco acreage, the entire allotment until you have proved to the County ASC committee that you deserve to have the acreage back in your name next year. There is a lot of trouble which has to be gone to in order to have the tobacco acreage reinstated once it is lost, according to Duplin ASC Office Manager Rufus Elks. Elks further adds: "We urge you to return your 1959 marketing cards immediately, or bring all of your 1959 bills of sales to County office so that we can have a record of your poundage."

Dr. S. A. Pope Gets Sentence For Abortion

Dr. S. A. Pope, of Beulaville, has been given a two to three-year suspended sentence in Duplin Criminal Superior Court on two counts of abortion.

Judge Henry A. Stevens, presiding, suspended the sentence upon condition that Dr. Pope pay court costs and placed him on probation for three years and instructed him not to practice gynecology for the length of the probation period.

The abortions were performed on two white girls from New Bern. The case was investigated by SBI Agent Frank Satterfield and E. P. Pearce. Dr. Pope has been practicing medicine in Duplin County for 15 years.

Cotton, Peanut Farmers To Vote December 15

Cotton and Peanut farmers will go to the polling places December 15, to vote on acreage controls on two commodities.

What the vote amounts to is whether the crops will be supported at 82 per cent of parity or 50 per cent of parity.

According to Rufus Elks, Duplin ASC office manager, if farmers approve acreage controls, then cotton and peanuts will be supported at 50 per cent of parity. If the farmers do not approve acreage controls, the support will be a 50 per cent of parity and in order for a farmer to receive 50 per cent of parity he must still plant within his farm's basic allotment.



Dr. Matthews Ch'm. Christmas Seal Sale

Dr. Ottos S. Matthews has been named the chairman of the 1959 Duplin Christmas Seal Sale Drive. The Campaign will begin November 16.

Following the announcement of his acceptance Dr. Matthews said: "The Annual Seal Campaign provides funds for the voluntary Tuberculosis control program in our community. I am sure the Campaign will be a success because the men, women and children of Duplin county are deeply concerned about the Tuberculosis problem in this Area. The funds that they contribute for the Christmas Seals do much to help prevent TB and to bring those who have it to the care of Physicians, thus resulting in a remarkable saving of lives."

Citing the Association's program, Dr. Matthews said: "The Duplin TB ASSOC. works constantly to protect us from this disease and to safeguard our children, now and in the future. Christmas gives each of us an opportunity to support this program by Contributing for and making liberal use of Tuberculosis Christmas Seals. The 53rd Annual Christmas Seal Campaign opens on November 15 and will run through December. The Funds donated are used to provide patient services, Health Education and case finding."

The announcement of Dr. Matthews' appointment was made by Dr. J. S. Blair, Jr., President of the Duplin TB Assoc. who said, "Under The Leadership of Dr. Matthews the 3rd. Annual Christmas Seal Campaign will be one of which we can all be proud."
