### Two Wrecks In Kenansville

During the past week end two accidents happened in the town of Kenansville. One happened Saturday morning at about 8:00 involving a 1957 Buick fordr, driven by Joseph Doughton Mills, 40 year old resident of Garner, and a 1960 Chevrolet pickup, driven by Lehman G. Williams of Route 2, Pink Hill, a 45-year old farmer. The accident happened on highway 24 in front of the home of Mrs. Charley Williamson. The pickup was making a left turn and the Buick was trying to pass the truck. The Buick struck the left side of the pickup, swerved to the left hand side of the road, across the curb and sidewalk, crashing into a fire hydrant and stopping in a vacant lot, the officer said. Driver of the pickup, Williams, suffered back injuries. Damages to the Buick were estimated at \$200 and to the pickup at \$200. Damage to the fire hydrant were estimated at \$200. Each was charged; the driver of the Buick for failing to sound horn for passing, and the driver of the pickup with failing to give the turn signal. Passengers in the car and pickup were not injured. At about 3:00 on Sunday afternoon on Stokes Street in Kenansville the second accident occurred. Jimmy Leo Jackson, a 16 year old high school student, was driving a 1957 Ford hardtop, Joseph Moore, 36, of route 1, Magnolia was driving a 1954 Chevrolet. According to reports, Jackson was in the process of slowing down to make a right turn into an driveway when Moore came up behind him and ran into the rear of his car. ### Farm Census Field Work Began Nov. 18

Field work in the 1959 Census of Agriculture got underway locally on Nov. 18 1959 when a force of Census takers will start visiting every farm in the area. It was announced recently by Field Director Joseph R. Norwood of the Census Bureau's regional office at Charlotte. Farm census questionnaires have been mailed to all farm operators. The census takers will visit all local farms to collect the questionnaires and if necessary, assist the farmer in filling out the report form. The 1959 Census of Agriculture is the 17th in a series of nationwide farm canvasses, the first of which was conducted in 1840. The Census of Agriculture is taken at five-year intervals to provide up-to-date statistical information about the nearly five million farms which supply food and raw materials for manufacture of goods used by the people of the United States, now numbering about 178 million. The current census will yield information on the number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock production and inventories, selected farm facilities and equipment and selected farm expenditures. The field director emphasized that all information about individuals and their farm operation furnished to Census Bureau is held in absolute confidence under Federal law. It is used only to provide summary figures such as totals, averages, and percentages. The information on an individual report cannot be furnished to any other than sworn Census employees and thus cannot be used for investigation, taxation, or regulation.

### Duplin County Tax Collections Are Up Over 1958

Duplin County tax collections for the current fiscal year are above the collections for the same period in 1958. Duplin County Auditor F. W. McGowan said that records turned into his office by Tax Collector Harry Phillips show that \$645,361.74 has been collected from July 1, 1959 through October 31, 1959 as compared to \$639,397.03 for the same period in 1958. October collections were up considerably in 1959 over 1958. The 1958 collections totaled \$127,445.16 while this year's October collections totaled \$128,550.07.
