S. 90-205)."

Thus the only bodies which may be buriad at county expense are thoes the State Board of Anatomy refuse to take and only rarely will the Board refuse a body. Counties KENANSVILLE should therefore be sure that the Samuel Lawrence Washignton Board has been notified and has Lola Boney Smith refused the body, before spending Enoch Alton Newton county funus for purial."
