change from base specifications will be recorded in the pricing schedule and on the record cards.

Unit land values are to be submitted to the county Advisory Committee before being adopted.

In determining the value of land the appraisers shall consider as to each tract, its advantages as to location, quality of soil, quantity and quality of timber, water power, water privileges, mineral or other valuable deposits, fertility, crop adaptability, adaptability for agricultural, commercial or industrial uses, the past income therefrom, its probable future income, the purchase and sale price of said land and similar lands; and any other factor which may effect its value.

In determining the value of a building, the appraisers shall consider at least its location, type of construction, age, replacement cost, adaptability for residence, commercial or industrial uses, lease or rental arrangements, the past income therefrom, the probable future income, the purchase and sale price of such building and other similar buildings, and any other factors which may effect its value.

In determining the value of personal property, the appraisers shall consider at least the replacement cost, its age and depreciation, its industrial or commercial use, its productivity, the purchase and sale price of said personal property or similar property and any other factor which may effect its value.

The revaluation program is to be completed by October 1, 1951 so that the values will be available for the list takers on January 1, 1952.

As per usual the big red teams from lower Duplin bring support as well as a fine team each time they play. Leading a little toward the James Kenan teams I can't help but wonder why we every try to support a basketball team. That's a mighty big word "try" because if you take the people from Magnolia and Kenansville away from James Kenan and leave Warsaw it would be pure pathetic. Anyway in the opening game Wednesday night the undefeated Beulville Lassies with an 8-0 conference record and a bye in the first round just did get by the North Duplin Rebels 44-36. North Duplin really got off to a good start leading 13-10 at the end of the first quarter, and came off the floor leading 19-18 at the half. And it just looked like the first upset in the making. The Rebels increased the lead to 23-26 at the end of the third period, and the crowd was wild with excitement. But in the disastrous fourth the upset began to fade as the big red coats most of the game came to life and pulled it out of the fire 44-36.

Katie Sue Grady led the attack for the undefeated Beulville Lassies with 20 points, but Barbara Walker, with a fine hook shoot was high for the evening with 23. Joyce Blizzard, Beulville's leading scorer over the past several seasons came close to Grady in scoring with 18 points, while Rita Sumner and Linda Albertson rounded out the Panthers scoring with 4 and 2 points respectively. Others scoring for the Rebels were Billie Sue McCullen with 8, and Jo Ann Cole 5.

The Duplin County Conference Champs from Beulville had a real hard time in the boys bracket getting by the always tough North Duplin five 46-30. The Panthers of Coach Bostic got off to a fairly good start by the Rebels kept right on when the big red out scored them 16-4. Tobby Sumner, a little outside man really put on a show with his fine ball handling and of course shooting. Sumner led the Panthers with 16 points, while John Clifton came in high for North Duplin with 9. Others scoring for the winners were Benny Thomas with 11, Willie Horne and Benney Kennedy 6 each, and Jamie Quinn 4. Leading the scoring attack along with Clifton for the Rebels were Roger Mazingo 6, Doug Kennedy 6, and Pete Warren 3. Mazingo was the rebound star of the game bringing down 11 rebounds and playing an outstanding game on defense.

Now, Thursday night of this week the North Duplin girls will take on the Chinquapin Lassies in the consolation Championship. Following the girls, the North Duplin boys will tangle with the B. F. Grady Panthers for the boys consolation Championship.

Then on Friday night the B. F. Grady girls take on the undefeated Beulville Lady Panthers, and the Beulville boys take on James Kenan for the Duplin County Tournament Championship.
